SOPHE encourages and provides a forum for scholarship in the philosophical, historical, and social foundations of education, educational biography, pedagogical praxis, and the education-liberal arts nexus. For its scholarly presentations, SOPHE prefers argumentative, thesis-driven papers, clearly linked to larger philosophical, historical, and social issues concerning education as a social institution and the connections between education and the liberal arts including biography, history, literature, the sciences, and mathematics. We invite proposals from scholars in colleges of education and arts and sciences, graduate students, and independent scholars.. In all cases, individual presentations should be timed to finish within the strict limit of TWENTY (20) MINUTES.

Panel Presentations (three or more presenters) should be timed to finish in FIFTY (50) MINUTES. Graduate student presentations are encouraged.

Proposals should be 200-300 word abstracts or summaries of the presentation. Versions of presentations may be submitted for publication in the refereed *Journal of Philosophy and History of Education* and may be up to 15 pages double spaced (4500 words).

Vitae Scholasticae: *The Journal of Educational Biography*

We welcome your submissions!

Our journal has been in circulation for 35 years. The journal welcomes submissions under the broad umbrella of educational biography. We include research into the lives of educators and those whose lives are educative, including traditional biographical accounts as well as diverse methods such as narrative, oral history, autobiography, ethnography, autoethnography, and self-study. We welcome research articles, creative reflections, and book reviews.

Research manuscripts should be a maximum of 30 pages in length (including references), double-spaced, printed in 12-point font, and have a 1" margin on all sides. Book reviews should be a maximum of 2,000 words and should attend to the methodological components of the text as well as its potential uses. Our reflections and applications section welcomes work of any length that reflects on biography creatively, whether through review essays, teaching pieces, or poetic engagements. Authors should submit manuscripts electronically to the editor in Microsoft Word. All identifying information (author's name, affiliation, position, fax number, and e-mail address) should be submitted in a separate electronic file.

Identifying information should not appear in the manuscript in order to ensure impartial review. Manuscripts are reviewed anonymously by at least two members of the Editorial Board or affiliates. All submissions are acted upon as quickly as possible. Usually, decisions are made within 3 months. All statements of fact or points of view in articles are the responsibility of authors and do not represent any official position of the International Society for Educational Biography.

All manuscripts must be prepared according to the Chicago Manual of Style (16th edition). Note that *Vitae Scholasticae: The Journal of Educational Biography* uses the Notes method rather than the Author-Date method. Please consult the style guidelines for more information.
