- The 2023 Conference took place on October 5-7, 2023, Theme: Life Stories Across Times and Spaces.
- The New Board! At its Business Meeting, the ISEB thanked Edward (Ed) Janak for his dedicated service for the past three years as the conference chair (online, 2021), President (2021-22), and Past President (2022-23). Jie Zhang succeeded Ed as Past President, and Sherry Mou stepped up to be President. Yacine Kout was nominated and unanimously supported as President Elect and 2024 Conference Chair. Ludovic Sourdot was selected to replace Yacine's unfinished term. Penny Seals, who was on the membership drive subcommittee last year, was elected to become the new ISEB Social Media officer. The rest of the board remain the same: Penny Craig (Secretary), Prairie Endres-Parnell (Treasurer), Lucy Bailey (Journal Editor), and Jared Stallones (At-Large). Recap of the 2023 Oklahoma Conference

From **October 5th to 7th**, at the Hefner Room of the Courtyard by Marriott Oklahoma City Downtown, **13 sessions** and **30 presenters** from Australia, Canada, India, Japan, and the US covered a wide range of topics on life writing. Thanks to Ed Janak, who kept the conference for those who were joining on Zoom; Penny Craig, who ensured the smooth running of internet and onsite connections; Prairie Endres-Parnell, whose daily lucky surprise draw brought excitement at the end of every day; and Penny Seals, who diligently posted on Instagram streams of photos and event as they took place. At the joint Banquet of the ISEB and SOPHE (The Society of Philosophy and History of Education), Jie Zhang delivered a captivating presidential address, entitled "Eileen Chang and the Literary Sojourner." Though an unfamiliar name to most of the audience, Eileen Chang turned out to be one of the most important Chinese writers of the 20th century through her works and legendary life. The speech was streamed online and a handful of online attendees joined those at the banquet to ask questions.

A shout-out to all the graduate student presenters and other first-time participants and a salute to all the rest. From Indian politician and poet (Limbu and Nanda) and ancient China's philosophers (Yeh and Yao) to early modern and contemporary American educators (Prochner, Tyson, and Atkinon) to heart-wrenching autoethnography (Ross, Freebersysser, Moore, Bingham, and Abernathy), they shed new light on conventional subjects. Others looked at notable, historical, and personal lives from a wide range of angles and through varied lenses—juvenile biography aiming at STEM fields (Miller), a parallel between a private life and the history of pop music (Stafford), the symbiotic relations between students and mentors (Brown and Helvie-Mason), "a grounding helix" between a rural place and its people (Hany), and variant reflections on the personal and the political of immigrant lives (Lumbreras and Sourdot). Audiences wandered through three wars, two continents, and five countries with a Chinese scholar (Wang) and collaborated on an experiment of group listening and answering (Joyce and Tamashiro). All this research enriched ISEB's mission in life writing of the educators and educational life writings.

At the ISEB Business Meeting, Jie Zhang thanked Jared Stallones and Prairie Endres-Parnell for their help finding the 2024 conference site; she also expressed gratitude to outgoing board members Edward Janak and Vanessa Garry for their exemplary service. Secretary Penny Craig revealed ISEB's new logo and Instagram site. *Vitae Scholasticae* editor Lucy Bailey led the discussion of moving the journal online in the near future. (Back issues of *Vitae Scholasticae* volumes 25-32 are on the ISEB web site.) Yacine Kout was nominated and unanimously approved as the new President Elect; two new members were elected to the board: Penny Seals and Ludovic Sourdot.

Featured BIOs of ISEB Members

At the conference, we asked two participants—a veteran and a first-timer ISEB member—to reflect on their experiences with the ISEB and their outlook of the organization. Here are what they shared:



Edward (Ed) Janak, Professor of Educational Studies at University of Toledo, first learned about ISEB when he took a class on educational biography in graduate school. He went to his first ISEB conference in 2008 and presented research from his dissertation. He got great feedback suggestions from a remarkably kind and generous audience (Thalia Mulvihill immediately came to his mind). Linda Morice, then editor of the ISEB journal, *Vitae Scholasticae*, talked to him about potential publication opportunities. He also heard an incredible variety of stories from the presenters and was truly awestruck by the gathering and sharing of "these really cool narratives." Since 2015, Ed has attended all the annual conferences and in recent years served on the Executive Board, taking leadership roles and spearheading the ISEB in a new direction.

Over the years, Ed has published several articles and book reviews for *Vitae Scholasticae*, and he always finds the revision and editorial feedback amazing. In fact, his association with *Vitae Scholasticae* and other ISEB activities has allowed him to reframe a book project he is working on, switching from "a kind of traditional history" to "a collective biographical approach." From his early days as a somewhat aimless, enthusiastic graduate student participant to his leadership in recent years, Ed looks fondly at how his academic trajectory has been nurtured, molded, and enriched by the ISEB (along with the Pop Culture Association). From people like Linda and Thalia

who mentored him to the new website and ISEB logo unveiled at this year's conference, there are too many things to like about ISEB. Ed sees "nothing but good and positive as the group's moving forward." (SM)

community. Marcus cherished the relationships built between presentations. He loved following up with presenters and hearing their passions and expertise. He especially appreciated Susan Hany's presentation named "Beyond Rural Code 4," and he was "shocked to hear the similarities in experience we had within our cities." Marcus feels our stories are very important for one another to learn and grow as a diverse society. The ISEB gives a platform for individuals to explore some lost stories or stories through a different lens. He also thinks it's important for his students to have an opportunity to connect with others who can push them to greater heights. He went back to campus raving about how he enjoyed the ISEB experience and sharing all of the information he learned. Marcus will definitely attend the St. Louis conference in 2024. As for a topic, he is leaning towards exploring barbershop talks in urban communities and their research value or exploring biases between street gangs and fraternities. (JZ)

She currently teaches at Tarleton State University, has served on the ISEB board in various positions since 2018, and has been a member since around 2015.
